

¹⁶"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.


¹⁷"Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him."



as we forgive those who trespass against us.






COMMUNION DISTRIBUTION

- \blacksquare After receiving the bread, you may take an individual cup or drink from the chalice.
- You may return to your seat after communing.
- Those who do not wish to commune may come forward for a blessing. Please cross your arms over your chest to indicate this preference.
- Reception of the Eucharist under one kind (bread or wine) is valid communion for those who must avoid either for health reasons.
- If you are unable to go to the altar for communion, please notify an usher or the pastor, so that communion may be brought to you in your pew.


